# "Not an End, But a Beginning"

This year's Conclave was held at our very own Camp Arrowhead on the camp's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Camp Arrowhead is the oldest continuously operating Boy Scout Camp west of the Mississippi River. Our lodge hosted the event, which took place from October 8-10. Among the lodges in attendance were Black Hawk, Lodge 67: Dzie-Hauk Tonga, Lodge 429; Nampa-Tsi, Lodge 216; Tamegonit, Lodge 147; and Wah-Sha-She, Lodge 42.

The activities began with a chill on Saturday morning when a few brave arrowmen went to the pool at six o'clock for the Polar Bear Plunge. Those who endured the frigid water for a full thirty minutes received an award at the Conclave show.

After breakfast began several very interesting training classes, which lasted until lunch. Classes were an hour long each and included Mapping the Outdoors, Backpack Cooking, Ultra Light Backpacking, Crossover Ceremonies, Beadwork and Finger Weaving, Camping Promotion, Website Development and

Promotion, Newsletter Promotion, Dance and Regalia, Symbolism in the Ordeal, Ordeal Retention/ Brotherhood Conversion, and Leave No Trace. All of the courses provided great instruction on everything from using modern technology to backpacking with next to nothing.

Following Lunch, there were many fun activities to participate in such as shooting sports, ultimate Frisbee, basketball, and sand volleyball. Additionally, there was Indian dance information and instruction and a Pre-Ordeal ceremony competition. Our lodge gave a great performance of the Pre-Ordeal ceremony and received the first place award.

When the activities were over, Section C5-B held its 2005 officer elections in the dining hall. Kansa and Mandan Lodges join Tamegonit and Wah-Sha-She Lodges to make up the new section. # **LLD Weekend**



Wah-Sha-She Lodge's Lodge Leadership Development (LLD) weekend was held from November 12-14 at Camp Arrowhead. LLD is a training event that is designed to give valuable knowledge to current and upcoming lodge leaders. All 2005 officers were highly encouraged to come; any other arrowmen who sought leadership knowledge were

also welcome to attend.

Training courses began on Saturday morning after breakfast. The first class was "OATR: What is my Role?" which was taught by Justin Haseltine. This class stressed the importance of the unit representative and outlined his role as a communicator between the unit and the lodge/

chapter. Sean Simmons then taught "Unit Elections." In this, he discussed the unit election process, problems that can be run into and their solutions, and the significance of making a good impression upon the unit. After a short break, Kurt Garner taught "Chapter Management" with the assistance of Ben Murray. They gave information on meeting discussion topics, chapter training ideas, chapter calendar content, and other things that have proved to be useful knowledge for chapters.

Following Lunch, Nathan Rouse gave a presentation on "Running a Lodge Meeting." He covered things that need to be done before, during, and after a meeting, and he also gave an overview of Robert's Rules of Order, which are followed in lodge meetings. Justin Kolker then taught a class about "Increasing Brotherhood Conver-

sion." He discussed how to make ordeals want to be brotherhood and also explained the "I-words" of conversion. Next, Steve Tilley presented "Communication Through the Lodge." He explained the structure of communication from the national level all the way to the troop level. He also provided great information about how a newsletter and a website should be run.

Once a break had been taken, a meeting was held to decide upon the 2005 Lodge Goals. After that was dinner, which was followed by a Lodge Executive Council (LEC) meeting led by Steve Tilley. At the end of the meeting, it was announced that all arrowmen who attended the LLD weekend are now voting members on the LEC.

LLD weekend was very successful in providing useful leadership knowledge to all arrowmen who came to the event. There was a great turn out; hopefully, there will be an even better turn out next year.

  - a. Camp Arrowhead promotion video
  - b. FCSR promotion video
- 9. Implement the OATR program
  - a. Have Lodge database of all OATRs
- 10. Increase LLD attendance
- 11. Complete new OA competition regalia

# Jamboree Scholarship Fund

Thanks to Wah-Sha-She Lodge and some other donors there is over \$10,000 available to help Scouts from Ozark Trails Council attend the 2005 National Jamboree.

The auction at Sectional Conclave raised \$14.31.82 for Jamboree Scholarships. This along with the \$2145.50 that was raised at Fall Encampment brings the auction total to \$3557.32.

The Lodge Executive Committee had already committed \$600.00 to the fund. The Region has committed \$1800 and other donors have contributed \$4150 bringing the

grand total to \$10,107.32.

Scholarships will be available to help cover the costs for youth members of the contingent who would not otherwise be able to afford to attend.

# Leadership in Service Award (2005-2007)

### **Forward**

The 2003-2007 OA Strategic Plan states that "the heart of the Order of the Arrow is its heritage of service." With the Leadership in Service Program, the OA strives to strengthen Scouting's foundation of service by further fostering in Arrowmen the ethic of servant leadership. By promoting and rewarding service that benefits the Boy Scouts of America's outdoor program and the communities in which Scouts' reside, the Order will be acting to support the Scouting program at the most important levels.

### **Award Requirements**

Arrowmen must complete the following requirements each year in which they earn the award:

- Give 8 hours of service participating in a lodge, chapter, or council service project benefiting a local council camp (lodge induction weekends count). Service may be split over two or more events.\*
- Give 6 hours of service doing a community service project planned and run by the lodge or chapter.\*\*
- Working as camp staff does not fulfill the council service requirement.
- \*\* Lodges are encouraged to use the OA's Lodge Guide to Community Service to aid them in planning community service projects.

### **Leadership in Service Award Timeline**

The timeline for the Leadership in Service Award is a graduated system that encourages Arrowmen to continue their service from year to year. Requirements for the award can be met during the calendar years of 2005, 2006, and 2007. Service from a previous year cannot be carried over to meet the next year's requirements (Arrowmen of all ages may earn the first year award in 2005, 2006, or 2007, the second year award in 2006 or 2007, and the third year award in 2007 only).

#### Deadlines

All awards must be completed by December 31, 2007, the final year of the program.

Order of the Arrow lodges have until March 1, 2006 (postmark date) to submit their order form for the 2005 awards. Lodges ordering 2006 and 2007 awards will have until March 1 of the next year to submit their order form.

### **Ordering the Award**

Arrowmen who complete the Leadership in Service Award requirements will be able to secure recognition from their lodge. Lodges will receive an order form in their Lodge Program Support Pak after they recharter.

The award for first time recipients (ribbon) costs \$5.00. The awards for second and third time recipients (silver and bronze feathers) cost \$2.00.

#### **Additional Information**

### Requirements for Adults

Adults can earn the Leadership in Service Award by completeing the same requirements that youth must fulfill.

#### Administration

The Leadership in Service Award form and fees must be submitted from the local council office. The order form must be signed by the Lodge Chief, Lodge Adviser, and Staff Adviser or Scout Executive. Copies of this form may be sent in multiple times during the year, as Arrowmen complete the award.
